Please let me express my deepest respect that you are hearing Lindsay Clancy's tragic story in your courtroom. I understand how heart wrenching this family's story is to hear since it has caused myself and other nurses, doctors, and others included in the MassGeneral Brigham family, heartbreak since that dreadful night.

I met Lindsay Musgrove when she was a student nurse with the Massachusetts General Hospital School of Health Professionals. She shadowed me, as a nursing student, since I was not only a Postpartum nurse but also a Lactation Consultant. Lindsay made quite an impression as a student because she was so eager to learn and to help our new mothers and their babies. Lindsay was like a ray of sunshine when she stepped onto the unit, full of positive energy and always looking to help in any way possible. When she graduated, we encouraged her to apply to work with us. She was so excited to serve our patients and extremely dedicated as a new nurse. We seasoned nurses love it when we have a new colleague that is hungry to learn and devoted to doing their very best for the families we serve.

Your Honor, please know that Lindsay is a strong, compassionate, and loving nurse, who no one would ever imagine could harm anyone. I am so heavy-hearted to hear the pain that she had been suffering with after the birth of each of her children. Our health care model fails family's like the Clancy family. We do very little to concretely help a mother who is suffering with postpartum depression and when it comes to postpartum psychosis we fail completely! Lindsay and her loving husband Pat, were desperately seeking help and were betrayed by an inadequate medical system that has not devoted enough resources nor time learning how to help our new mothers. Since this has happened the Boston Globe has written a number of stories highlighting the prevalence of postpartum depression, the rarity of psychosis, and the on-going research to find solutions to help those who suffer.

As a Maternal Child Health nurse, I was shocked to see the number of medications that had been prescribed to Lindsay! Many of us in this field know the dangers using multiple medications especially when combined with hormonal fluctuations. There is a reason that we keep women in hospital until we can find the correct medication for her blood pressure, blood sugar, and it should be no different for women with PP depression. I am heart broken that this beautiful young woman, her loving husband and their precious children have been destroyed because they were not provided with the essential medical care that they deserved. Please know that if our Lindsay had proper treatment this family would still be together. Your Honor, I beseech you to order her the best medical care Boston care provide. Please know that she deserves no further punishment since they will suffer an unbearable grief for the rest of their lives.

To Whom this May Concern,

My friendship with Lindsay began when we met in 6th grade. We connected quickly in those early days as we started middle school together. Since then, over 20 years later, I can honestly say, Lindsay is the type of friend I am not just lucky to have found as a child, she has consistently been the kind of person anyone would be fortunate to meet in a lifetime.

From an early age I saw that Lindsay's biggest goals in life were clear:

- She wanted to grow up and work in a medical related field, likely with babies
 - She wanted to meet a nice guy who would be a great husband and father one day
 - The biggest one of all was to be an amazing Mom and fill her life with children
- She did just that. To no one's surprise:
- She decided on nursing for her career, specifically Labor & Delivery (L&D)
 - She met her husband, a wonderful person with great family values
 - And she had the children she always dreamed about.

Lindsay's accomplishments as an individual were always impressive... a top-of-the-class student, talented athlete, a caring nurse, a passionate teacher... she always had an admirable drive and an ability to excel in anything she took on, still, she definitely identified most with her joy, passion, pride and purpose of being a Mom. She felt it was the most rewarding and fulfilling thing life has to offer.

A few of the early signs of her passion for children in high school included signing up for the optional child development classes and choosing to work at a daycare. Her responsible nature and love for children inspired our Child Development class teacher to ask Lindsay to be one of the students to babysit at a special event for her own family. As we got older, we also shared a babysitting job where the family clearly loved her and it was no surprise when she would engage with babies at any event. Fast forward to when she became a L&D nurse, she chose to expand on that position by also getting certified to teach L&D classes to further her involvement in the field of care for expecting parents and babies.

We stayed close through high school, college and now, about ten years later, despite our lives taking us in some different directions, our friendship has always remained strong. During that time, we were at many birthdays, graduations, engagements, showers and other bridal events. I was a bridesmaid in her wedding, we were bridesmaids in three other weddings together, attended housewarmings, baby celebrations and more. She proudly brought her kids to many of those events. She often went out of her way to travel back to CT to support friends & family in good times and bad, or just to keep in touch. Outside of all the events, we also spent many of life's "regular days" together just catching up and/or spending time with her children who she proudly shared with us.

Naturally, her devotion to her family was no surprise to me. When she got engaged, I can remember her eagerness to start her family right away once married. While many brides get caught up on the tedious details of the wedding planning for the party itself, I admired her ability to look past those and instead focus on what really mattered about that milestone, wanting to share her life with a great person and start a family. I remember at the wedding there were a

bunch of her nieces and nephews there and as they all gathered for a photo you could see her joy being surrounded by all those little ones and she couldn't wait to have her own. Unsurprisingly, she did start a family quickly and excelled at that too. She became a go-to resource that most of our friends who are also Moms went to for advice from pregnancy to childbirth, to newborns, to toddlers...a "What would Lindsay do?" vibe became common among friends in considering how to handle the challenges of fertility, pregnancy and parenting. While I have not had children yet, Lindsay and I often bonded over our love for big families, as I myself come from a family with four children and have been looking forward to starting that chapter of my life one day. It was often her I would confide in, and I recall a quote we both love by Mother Teresa, "How can you say there are too many children? That is like saying there are too many flowers." She loved to hear about other people becoming parents too, even people she hardly knew or didn't know. I would always share with her when others from my life were having babies and she would fill with excitement and want to know more. In fact, one of my friends (from a different friend group) had a baby last week and my first instinct was to share the news with Lindsay. To say that babies and motherhood are her ultimate passion is an understatement.

As the majority of my peers have young children and babies, I have observed the way many handle parenting and what approach they take. The top words I would say that come to mind for Lindsay are patient and selfless. While she has always found a way to support friends, she knew how to be there for us, but also prioritize leaving social events early when she felt like it was best that she got home to her children, or in thinking about how she needed to try to get enough sleep to be her best for them the next day. She put them first and was so cautious with them, whether it was actually checking them with her stethoscope, ensuring they were getting enough sleep, or just holding them for as long as it took for them to settle down if that is what they needed. I can remember her carefully picking out what items were safest to use in the house in terms of cleaning products and other household needs. While it is common for parents to let their children cry as part of sleep training, Lindsay worried that her children may feel sad, scared, or alone, so instead, she would often sacrifice her own sleep to make sure they were comfortable. She did not like to leave them in a state of distress even if it was a safe place such as with another family member, she worried about if there could be lasting emotional effects if she let them cry without her at this delicate age. She went above and beyond trying to ensure they were happy in the present and would be in the future. Other ways she thought of their futures include a sweet activity at her daughter's first birthday party, where she had us each write a special note that she would open and share with her on her 18th birthday. She was still even recently thanking me for a custom book that I got for her daughter years ago and how special it had been to read it together and how she wanted to get more books like that for her children. She was planning for what schools they would go to next; she was considering getting a pet one day due to her child's love of animals, and she would make little predictions on what her kids would be like when they were older based on their unique personalities.

It would be no surprise if someone in her position would naturally bond more with others who are at a similar stage of life, but as a friend I never felt left out with Lindsay. No matter how different our lives were, or how busy she was prioritizing her family, she always managed to prioritize making her friends feel special too and supported me in anything I had happening in my life, she has been a natural cheerleader for others. In every heartache or challenge I have experienced, she has been one of the first to send a thoughtful message, write a meaningful card,

send a kind gift, donate to a relevant cause, check in, do whatever was needed to show support and ensure I was ok, this includes as recently as this January where I opened a card and donation from our group of friends which contributed to a charitable memorial scholarship I am involved in. I wrote a thank you message to the group, and she was the first to write back with a "love you" message. This was after already having sent me some heartfelt words of her own and contributing to another gift prior. She remained the friend I have known for 20+ years, despite juggling the responsibilities of Motherhood and everything else in her life. She kept her friendships strong and embraced the changes that came along with parenting by sharing her beautiful family with us.

I think one of the best ways to gather Lindsay's true character was through something we learned way back in that Child Development class in high school, by watching her children. This is called observational learning that would often come out during playtime. It is the concept that children at that age often play by mimicking what they see at home and the way they themselves are treated. This is especially true when a child plays the common game of "house", where they go about doing things that their own family does, often using dolls to represent the children in the family. It is common in these cases that a little girl plays the role of "Mommy" and treats the dolls as their own babies in the same way that their own Mom treats them and their siblings. Her oldest child, Cora, loved playing "House" and "Mommy" and was constantly playing with her dolls in a sweet gentle nature, copying as she watched her Mom swaddle her brothers as babies. Unsurprisingly she also wanted to grow up and have a job in the medical field like her Mom and would mimic that with her toy set as well. She cared for her actual brothers in the sweetest way, with the traits that mirrored what she saw through Lindsay. Cora was her little "mini-me." Lindsay loved her daughter beyond words and was equally ecstatic to raise sons as well. Her son Dawson was fun-loving and kind even at his young age and baby Cal's happy nature was noticeable already. On a recent visit with them, we played in the yard, she talked about how her and her son had just shared a special one-on-one breakfast and what a fun age he was at, she proudly held baby Cal and she talked about the sweet happenings in the life of her beautiful daughter. The kids were all happy and healthy. The special sweet nature of her children is the ultimate testament to Lindsay's character.

I am very fortunate to have many wonderful family and friends in my life, and even still, Lindsay has continuously stood out as one of the extra special ones. She is one of the people I have trusted most, especially with anything related to children. In every example that I think of her, the themes are all essentially the same; she has been consistently caring, thoughtful, patient, compassionate, loving towards others, and has had a serious devotion to give her best in all she does, especially for her children.

children: Cora, Dawson, Callan. We would play outside, go to the park and last year the 350 jubilee parade in our hometown.

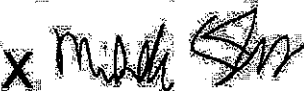

During our friendship, we experienced all of life's traditional milestones together - proms, graduations, moving to Boston, being bridesmaids in each other's weddings, and most recently, motherhood.

Growing up, Lindsay was a kind, thoughtful, and loving friend to me and the other three girls in our close-knit group. She was always there for us during the best and worst times of our adolescence, whether it was being a shoulder to cry on after a tough breakup in high school, helping us with difficult school assignments, or cheering us on at our respective interests and hobbies. Lindsay's generosity also expanded past her family and friends. She was involved in various charitable organizations and endeavors growing up, such as taking leaves for the elderly in her neighborhood each year and working as Certified Nursing Assistant at the local nursing home in our town. Her compassion and love for her patients even back then speaks volumes to the dedication, love, and passion she continued to share with individuals in her care during her time as a labor and delivery nurse.

She constantly checked in to see how I was doing and answered all of my new mom questions, no matter how silly they were. I remember her overnight mailing me different types of swaddles to try when I expressed that I couldn't find one my daughter liked - that was how thoughtful she always was. She understood that each person's baby and experience with motherhood is unique, and she never passed judgement when I chose to make a parenting decision that differed from her own. As someone who enjoys knowing all the facts, Lindsay knew to speak my unique parenting language by providing me with objective, but gentle advice whenever I needed it. As my daughter got older, she continued to be my "go-to" for anything parenting or child related.

Due to our children being close in age, I have had the privilege of spending time with Lindsay and her children throughout the years. Our families spent time going for walks, playing at the local parks, swimming in my pool, and attending the church carnival together. She was so happy and proud to be a mom to Cora, Dawson, and Callan. Anyone who saw her with her kids could immediately tell how much she loved her children, and it was evident how much they adored her, as well. Her eyes would light up whenever she talked about them, and she was always proudly sharing photos and anecdotes. I remember how excited she was when Cora started speaking her first words, the fun she had introducing Dawson to his "first 100 foods", and the pure love and

Mr. Reddington,

My name is Michael C. Petta. We do not know each other, although we met briefly in court about 15 years ago. I am a 51-year-old Massachusetts native raised in Brockton who recently retired from 30 years of military service. Over my last 14 years in the U.S. Coast Guard, I was a government attorney and military JAG. Now retired from uniformed service, I live in Westwood, MA and write this evening to humbly offer my no-cost help in the Clancy case.

In addition to being a long-term service member, I am also a father of three. About 10 years ago, my young-adult daughter was prescribed an SSRI and an antipsychotic. While on these drugs, her mental state deteriorated intensely, leaving her delusional and uncharacteristically angry and randomly violent. At the most dire moment, she attempted to jump from a window in our 5th-floor apartment. Fortunately, I was present and pulled her to safety. She's now 28 years old, married, and expecting her first child—a son.

I don't like talking about that time beyond close family. However, I recently saw you on the news discussing Mrs. Clancy and the apparent chemical concoction given to her. It reminded me of my daughter's difficult time 10 years ago, and recognizing how lucky we are to still have her here, I felt an overwhelming obligation to offer my help to Mrs. Clancy's family and your team.

I offer my services as an attorney and truly ask for nothing in return. I have limited criminal experience. Other than serving as a Special Assistant U.S. Attorney for a federal sentencing case in the Northern District of Ohio some years ago, my criminal law experience is almost exclusively in the military justice context. I cannot offer skills as a trial attorney. What I do offer, however, are well-honed skills in legal research and writing, to the extent they could help your team and the Clancy family, and a doggedness formed over 30 years in uniform. As I work full-time, I can only offer my help on a part-time basis. But, again, I offer my assistance at no cost - I want nothing but to help.

I recognize you don't know me, and you have every reason to think that I'm some whack-job, busy-body, or attention-seeker. It may sound corny, but I'm just some kid from a broken home in Brockton who got better in the service and wants to do right without recognition for folks in tragic need. If you were to look at my presence on LinkedIn or any of my legal publications online (see links below), you would see I am who I describe above. I'd be glad to talk and further introduce myself if you have time for a phone call.

I know that you're busy. So, thank you for your time reading this email and for considering my offer. I look forward to hearing from you and to helping.

To Whom this May Concern,

My friendship with Lindsay began when we met in 6th grade. We connected quickly in those early days as we started middle school together. Since then, over 20 years later, I can honestly say, Lindsay is the type of friend I am not just lucky to have found as a child, she has consistently been the kind of person anyone would be fortunate to meet in a lifetime.

From an early age I saw that Lindsay's biggest goals in life were clear:

- She wanted to grow up and work in a medical related field, likely with babies
- She wanted to meet a nice guy who would be a great husband and father one day
- The biggest one of all was to be an amazing Mom and fill her life with children

She did just that. To no one's surprise:

- She decided on nursing for her career, specifically Labor & Delivery (L&D)
- She met her husband, a wonderful person with great family values
- And she had the children she always dreamed about.

Lindsay's accomplishments as an individual were always impressive... a top-of-the-class student, talented athlete, a caring nurse, a passionate teacher... she always had an admirable drive and an ability to excel in anything she took on, still, she definitely identified most with her joy, passion, pride and purpose of being a Mom. She felt it was the most rewarding and fulfilling thing life has to offer.

A few of the early signs of her passion for children in high school included signing up for the optional child development classes and choosing to work at a daycare. Her responsible nature and love for children inspired our Child Development class teacher to ask Lindsay to be one of the students to babysit at a special event for her own family. As we got older, we also shared a babysitting job where the family clearly loved her and it was no surprise when she would engage with babies at any event. Fast forward to when she became a L&D nurse, she chose to expand on that position by also getting certified to teach L&D classes to further her involvement in the field of care for expecting parents and babies.

We stayed close through high school, college and now, about ten years later, despite our lives taking us in some different directions, our friendship has always remained strong. During that time, we were at many birthdays, graduations, engagements, showers and other bridal events. I was a bridesmaid in her wedding, we were bridesmaids in three other weddings together, attended housewarmings, baby celebrations and more. She proudly brought her kids to many of those events. She often went out of her way to travel back to CT to support friends & family in good times and bad, or just to keep in touch. Outside of all the events, we also spent many of life's "regular days" together just catching up and/or spending time with her children who she proudly shared with us.

Naturally, her devotion to her family was no surprise to me. When she got engaged, I can remember her eagerness to start her family right away once married. While many brides get caught up on the tedious details of the wedding planning for the party itself, I admired her ability to look past those and instead focus on what really mattered about that milestone, wanting to share her life with a great person and start a family. I remember at the wedding there were a

bunch of her nieces and nephews there and as they all gathered for a photo you could see her joy being surrounded by all those little ones and she couldn't wait to have her own. Unsurprisingly, she did start a family quickly and excelled at that too. She became a go-to resource that most of our friends who are also Moms went to for advice from pregnancy to childbirth, to newborns, to toddlers... a "What would Lindsay do?" vibe became common among friends in considering how to handle the challenges of fertility, pregnancy and parenting. While I have not had children yet, Lindsay and I often bonded over our love for big families, as I myself come from a family with four children and have been looking forward to starting that chapter of my life one day. It was often her I would confide in, and I recall a quote we both love by Mother Teresa, "How can you say there are too many children? That is like saying there are too many flowers." She loved to hear about other people becoming parents too, even people she hardly knew or didn't know. I would always share with her when others from my life were having babies and she would fill with excitement and want to know more. In fact, one of my friends (from a different friend group) had a baby last week and my first instinct was to share the news with Lindsay. To say that babies and motherhood are her ultimate passion is an understatement.

As the majority of my peers have young children and babies, I have observed the way many handle parenting and what approach they take. The top words I would say that come to mind for Lindsay are patient and selfless. While she has always found a way to support friends, she knew how to be there for us, but also prioritize leaving social events early when she felt like it was best that she got home to her children, or in thinking about how she needed to try to get enough sleep to be her best for them the next day. She put them first and was so cautious with them, whether it was actually checking them with her stethoscope, ensuring they were getting enough sleep, or just holding them for as long as it took for them to settle down if that is what they needed. I can remember her carefully picking out what items were safest to use in the house in terms of cleaning products and other household needs. While it is common for parents to let their children cry as part of sleep training, Lindsay worried that her children may feel sad, scared, or alone, so instead, she would often sacrifice her own sleep to make sure they were comfortable. She did not like to leave them in a state of distress even if it was a safe place such as with another family member, she worried about if there could be lasting emotional effects if she let them cry without her at this delicate age. She went above and beyond trying to ensure they were happy in the present and would be in the future. Other ways she thought of their futures include a sweet activity at her daughter's first birthday party, where she had us each write a special note that she would open and share with her on her 18th birthday. She was still even recently thanking me for a custom book that I got for her daughter years ago and how special it had been to read it together and how she wanted to get more books like that for her children. She was planning for what schools they would go to next; she was considering getting a pet one day due to her child's love of animals, and she would make little predictions on what her kids would be like when they were older based on their unique personalities.

It would be no surprise if someone in her position would naturally bond more with others who are at a similar stage of life, but as a friend I never felt left out with Lindsay. No matter how different our lives were, or how busy she was prioritizing her family, she always managed to prioritize making her friends feel special too and supported me in anything I had happening in my life, she has been a natural cheerleader for others. In every heartache or challenge I have experienced, she has been one of the first to send a thoughtful message, write a meaningful card,

send a kind gift, donate to a relevant cause, check in, do whatever was needed to show support and ensure I was ok, this includes as recently as this January where I opened a card and donation from our group of friends which contributed to a charitable memorial scholarship I am involved in. I wrote a thank you message to the group, and she was the first to write back with a "love you" message. This was after already having sent me some heartfelt words of her own and contributing to another gift prior. She remained the friend I have known for 20+ years, despite juggling the responsibilities of Motherhood and everything else in her life. She kept her friendships strong and embraced the changes that came along with parenting by sharing her beautiful family with us.

I think one of the best ways to gather Lindsay's true character was through something we learned way back in that Child Development class in high school, by watching her children. This is called observational learning that would often come out during playtime. It is the concept that children at that age often play by mimicking what they see at home and the way they themselves are treated. This is especially true when a child plays the common game of "house", where they go about doing things that their own family does, often using dolls to represent the children in the family. It is common in these cases that a little girl plays the role of "Mommy" and treats the dolls as their own babies in the same way that their own Mom treats them and their siblings. Her oldest child, Cora, loved playing "House" and "Mommy" and was constantly playing with her dolls in a sweet gentle nature, copying as she watched her Mom swaddle her brothers as babies. Unsurprisingly she also wanted to grow up and have a job in the medical field like her Mom and would mimic that with her toy set as well. She cared for her actual brothers in the sweetest way, with the traits that mirrored what she saw through Lindsay. Cora was her little "mini-me." Lindsay loved her daughter beyond words and was equally ecstatic to raise sons as well. Her son Dawson was fun-loving and kind even at his young age and baby Cal's happy nature was noticeable already. On a recent visit with them, we played in the yard, she talked about how her and her son had just shared a special one-on-one breakfast and what a fun age he was at, she proudly held baby Cal and she talked about the sweet happenings in the life of her beautiful daughter. The kids were all happy and healthy. The special sweet nature of her children is the ultimate testament to Lindsay's character.

I am very fortunate to have many wonderful family and friends in my life, and even still, Lindsay has continuously stood out as one of the extra special ones. She is one of the people I have trusted most, especially with anything related to children. In every example that I think of her, the themes are all essentially the same; she has been consistently caring, thoughtful, patient, compassionate, loving towards others, and has had a serious devotion to give her best in all she does, especially for her children.

Mr. Reddington,

My name is Michael C. Petta. We do not know each other, although we met briefly in court about 15 years ago. I am a 51-year-old Massachusetts native raised in Brockton who recently retired from 30 years of military service. Over my last 14 years in the U.S. Coast Guard, I was a government attorney and military JAG. Now retired from uniformed service, I live in Westwood, MA and write this evening to humbly offer my no-cost help in the Clancy case.

In addition to being a long-term service member, I am also a father of three. About 10 years ago, my young-adult daughter was prescribed an SSRI and an antipsychotic. While on these drugs, her mental state deteriorated intensely, leaving her delusional and uncharacteristically angry and randomly violent. At the most dire moment, she attempted to jump from a window in our 6th-floor apartment. Fortunately, I was present and pulled her to safety. She's now 28 years old, married, and expecting her first child—a son.

I don't like talking about that time beyond close family. However, I recently saw you on the news discussing Mrs. Clancy and the apparent chemical concoction given to her. It reminded me of my daughter's difficult time 10 years ago, and recognizing how lucky we are to still have her here, I felt an overwhelming obligation to offer my help to Mrs. Clancy's family and your team.

I offer my services as an attorney and truly ask for nothing in return. I have limited criminal experience. Other than serving as a Special Assistant U.S. Attorney for a federal sentencing case in the Northern District of Ohio some years ago, my criminal law experience is almost exclusively in the military justice context. I cannot offer skills as a trial attorney. What I do offer, however, are well-honed skills in legal research and writing, to the extent they could help your team and the Clancy family, and a doggedness formed over 30 years in uniform. As I work full-time, I can only offer my help on a part-time basis. But, again, I offer my assistance at no cost—I want nothing but to help.

I recognize you don't know me, and you have every reason to think that I'm some whack-job, busy-body, or attention-seeker. It may sound corny, but I'm just some kid from a broken home in Brockton who got better in the service and wants to do right without recognition for folks in tragic need. If you were to look at my presence on LinkedIn or any of my legal publications online (see links below), you would see I am who I describe above. I'd be glad to talk and further introduce myself if you have time for a phone call.

I know that you're busy. So, thank you for your time reading this email and for considering my offer. I look forward to hearing from you and to helping.

I have been a nurse for 21 years. I have been working at Massachusetts General Hospital in the obstetric department since 2006. Specifically, I have worked on the labor & delivery unit since 2012. This work experience has given me the privilege of working side by side with Lindsay Clancy. Lindsay and I worked the night shift for many years together. I listened to her stories about planning a wedding, having children, and other life experiences in between.

Because I have been afforded the opportunity to work alongside Lindsay on the night shift for so many years I do feel I'm in a position to comment on her character as I know it from my perspective as her coworker.

I would like to share with you the person I know Lindsay to be.

I can remember a time prior to Lindsay and Pat getting married that Lindsay would say she wanted to have a baseball team of children. She would attend work baby showers or wedding showers and always ask to hold any of the babies in attendance. Her work family knew when she was pregnant almost as soon as she did. She wasted no time to share in her excitement to expand her family.

Many nights Lindsay would be sitting at the desk charting on her patients and rubbing her growing belly with any of her pregnancies. She asked her nursing coworkers for advice on the best baby items or favorite toy ideas for birthdays or holidays. She talked about choosing a preschool, taking the kids to the beach, buying a house, and more. She was so proud of her children, and shared many of their milestones any chance she had.

Lindsay is soft-spoken, gentle, kind, compassionate, and always with a listening ear. Even her most anxious patients loved her calming demeanor. Having a baby is stressful but Lindsay knew how to walk women through this step in their life with ease and she shined. Again, she SHINED. Because of her compassionate calming nature and her labor & delivery expertise I personally chose Lindsay to be my sister's labor & delivery nurse in 2019.

At work Lindsay talked lovingly of her children. She spied on them in the middle of the night via baby monitors and shared with us, her coworkers, the images of her sleeping children. She watched them sleep while she took breaks to pump breastmilk in the middle of the night. I firmly believe I have been gifted the opportunity to know Lindsay's true character and I thank you for allowing me to share the person I know Lindsay Clancy to be.

To the honorable Judge,

My name is Shelby Oster, and I am a registered dietitian that works at Massachusetts General Hospital (MGH). I am writing this letter on behalf of my husband and I for Lindsay Clancy. Though we do not know Lindsay on a personal or professional level, she was our labor and delivery (L&D) nurse while we delivered our first child spring 2021. My daughter will be two this spring and my husband, and I are expecting our second child this summer. As a health care worker, my expectations for my medical care are high. I acknowledge caring for other healthcare workers is often more difficult than individuals whose professions are outside of the medical field. With that said, I believe that my expectations for care within the medical system are higher than your average patient as I am continuously monitoring medical professionals' bedside manner, empathy, compassion, ability to advocate and communication skills. We had many good nurses and a few bad, but only one worth writing about.

It was a Saturday morning, my husband and I were feeling overjoyed to finally meet our daughter but quite nervous for what was coming. I was concerned because we were being admitted on a Saturday and I know staffing is limited. That alone brought unwanted nerves to this experience for me personally. Lindsay walked through the door and the first thing I noticed was how kind her eyes were. She wore personal protective equipment goggles and a surgical mask. All I could see were her eyes, but I could tell as she greeted us, she also had a warm and welcoming smile behind her mask. I've never felt more vulnerable than I did during the 3 days I spent on the L&D floor. And during this vulnerable time, Lindsay was kind, calm and demonstrated her clinical skills as a nurse. She helped my husband and I remain at ease throughout the process.

As labor progressed and staff transitioned from day to night, I was sad for her to leave because of how much I grew to trust her and how comfortable she made me while she was present. I felt guilty not wanting her to leave, but she shared she had her own family at home. I was just thankful to hear that she would be coming back again tomorrow.

Our delivery did not go as planned, but our overall experience was wonderful because of Lindsay. I am confident I couldn't have gotten through labor without her, she was my cheerleader through 2.5 days of labor that ended with an emergency C section. Most women don't remain on the L&D floor for more than 2 days, but we had her for 3 different 12-hour shifts. Lindsay demonstrated emotional stability as she always remained balanced and calm, even during the many stressful situations that developed during our labor and delivery experience. I felt safe during a time that was new and unpredictable for me. I knew during those events that she was advocating for me and my baby. You can tell she loved her job, and you could tell she enjoyed helping family's welcome children into the world. It takes a special person to be an extraordinary labor and delivery nurse to provide such reassurance and guidance and Lindsay was just one of those people.

When we found out I was pregnant with our second child this past Fall, I remember talking to my husband at dinner and saying, "I wonder if we can request Lindsay this time", and we laughed, fingers crossed hoping she would be our nurse again. Lindsay was the best nurse I've ever had and at this time I hope she can find peace. I hope this letter will provide you an idea of who Lindsay Clancy really is and that she deserves adequate medical treatment.

Hi there,

My name is Jonatha Kerr and I am a coworker of Lindsay. I am writing because I was told you need character letters for Lindsay.

I have been on the labor floor for the past 24 years. Lindsay probably started there about 8-9 years ago. She started off as a student studying in the IHP program at MGH to become a registered nurse.

The Lindsay I know is a wonderful nurse, colleague, mother and wife. On the labor floor, we nurses have what I consider a sisterhood of friendship. We range in ages from 22 to almost 76 years of age. As you can image that gap can be big, but we ALL are supportive of each other. We discuss many things, from colleagues that have boyfriends, girlfriends, to getting engaged, marriage, having kids, raising kids, to sending their kids to college, having grandchildren, going to loved one's funerals to ultimately retirement. And even then, we keep in touch with our colleagues by having get togethers, lunches, coffee or dinner.

I think it's because we work in labor and delivery and patients are at the most vulnerable time in their lives where they are bringing "life" into the world. Sadly, we also endure pain with our patients as sometimes we help patients bring "death" into the world, as patients can deliver a stillborn or find out at an office visit there is no heartbeat or even worst, there is something found out in ultrasound where their baby's life is not compatible with life. These are all "heavy" things we deal with on a daily basis on this unit and we as nurses have to care for them. We not only nurture the patient, but their partner and families as well. This can be a hard dynamic to nurse to, as some family members disagree, not communicate well with one another, etc. We as registered nurses are the "middle" person into their personal life for a moment in time.

Lindsay was always a team player and worked hard on the labor floor. She cared for her patients as if they were her own. If I ever needed a hand for help, she was there. She would help me with my patients' meds, turn patients if needed and help be the baby nurse for deliveries. She had a good work ethic. I remember a time when we worked nights during Covid and I had a Covid patient. You truly couldn't leave the room, you were gowned and gloved all shift (12 hours). I would call out for something, water, baby blankets a sticker for the patient's bloodwork, etc. Lindsay was there by my door getting me what I needed. At the end of the my patient's delivery, I had to thank her for being my "go-to" nurse as I had to remain in the room. Not all nurses would do this. She just knew, being in the same situation she would want someone there for her. She was empathic to her patients and colleagues. This is a character trait I always admired in her.

Now, we as nurses also get together outside of work as well. I remember a time, when our good friend, Julie had her baby shower at her house for the soon to be, baby Cora. We all got together, brought food and drinks, and celebrated her first pregnancy. We had such a great time. She was so happy and excited to deliver her first born. She had a "flamingo" theme nursery which was so cool and different. I

delivered without any medication. She had a HUGE baby girl, maybe 8-9 pounds. If anyone knows Lindsay, she has a tiny frame and I thought that was awesome.

The Lindsay I know, would NEVER do what happened 2 weeks ago, which is what is so shocking to me. She loved her kids and her husband so much. She loved being mother. She loved being a nurse.

Being a mother myself, and nurse, I know what postpartum depression is, as I had it with my first. Your hormones are off and you cry, laugh, cry again, sometimes even yell and scream. It is not the fun part about being a mother, but no one tells you about this part of motherhood. Everyone thinks you have a beautiful baby and family, but inside your emotions can be eating you alive. People ask you how you are doing, and we always answer, "good or well" as that is what society tells us to do, but deep down we are suffering. Mental illness is something you do not see.

I wish I had known Lindsay was suffering, I now know she was getting help, but maybe not the "right" kind of help.

The tragedy that happened in the Clancy household was not Lindsay.

I would bet my life on it.

Please consider this letter as testimony for her.

I stand with Lindsay Clancy.

I have known and worked with Lindsay for about 8 years at MGH. There is something truly special about working as a nurse, caring for women and their babies, that brings us together in a very unique way. Working 12 hour night shifts on labor and delivery can be long, emotionally and physically. We share things with each other that many don't ever get the opportunity to at other jobs. We care for women in their most vulnerable moments of their lives. We become a very close-knit family. Lindsay LOVED her career and most definitely loved her patients. From the moment I met her she was kind, sweet, warm and endearing. She was quiet and calming but definitely made her voice known. She never seemed to be bothered by much. Always such a positive light. I would openly get excited when I knew we were sharing a shift together because she was just someone you could confide in and she would always have your back. I cherished my years working with Lindsay.

I am actually 11 years older than Lindsay and at the time I met her, Lindsay was years ahead of me in terms of life goals and family planning... I almost poked fun at her because here I was still searching for my future husband while she was getting married to her loving husband and planning her future family of 6+. Her true dream. Dear Attorney Reddington,

You have asked me to describe the effects of the drugs Mrs. Clancy is alleged to have taken that contributed to Mrs. Clancy's bizarre behavior that led to the tragic death of her children and her attempted suicide which left her with permanent leg and spinal cord injuries.

Before I begin describing the pharmacology of these drugs, I have to say that every time I think about this case, I sit in amazement, on the brink of tears, considering the magnitude of the tragedy that occurred.

Lay people tend to think that if a physician prescribed the medications, that they cannot be hurt by the drugs. Nothing could be further from the truth. There is no such thing as a medication that does not have some side effects or isn't capable of causing severe adverse drug reactions in the recipient patient.

List of Drugs

There is no way of knowing what dose she took or how often she took any of these drugs!

Prozac (SSRI antidepressant) – specific serotonin reuptake inhibitor

side effects: suicidal ideation; abnormal thinking; emotional lability.
Zoloft (SSRI antidepressant) – specific serotonin reuptake inhibitor

As above.

Trazodone – as above; mania; impaired judgment.

Seroquel (quetiapine) – keep dose low – no way of knowing what dose she took

Amitryptiline – tricyclic antidepressant

Remeron – (mirtazapine) antipsychotic for major depressive disorders

Valium – anti-anxiety benzodiazepine – unmask depression

Klonopin (clonazepam) – As above

Ativan – anti-anxiety benzodiazepine – As above

Lamictal – antiseizure drug often used as an antidepressant

As someone who has personal experience around deceptive people in a legal setting, has anyone considered that Lindsay's husband be a suspect in the murder of their children? How can the prosecution be certain that he has an alibi when determining time of death may not be able to be so precise?

His GoFundMe page sounds incredibly fishy. So much doesn't add up. Her husband has already raised over \$1,000,000 in just a week. Supposedly she also simultaneously slit her wrists, throat AND jumped out a window (likely no more than 15' in the air, hardly enough to die from). Dear Attorney Reddington,

You have asked me to describe the effects of the drugs Mrs. Clancy is alleged to have taken that contributed to Mrs. Clancy's bizarre behavior that led to the tragic death of her children and her attempted suicide which left her with permanent leg and spinal cord injuries.

Before I begin describing the pharmacology of these drugs, I have to say that every time I think about this case, I sit in amazement, on the brink of tears, considering the magnitude of the tragedy that occurred.

Lay people tend to think that if a physician prescribed the medications, that they cannot be hurt by the drugs. Nothing could be further from the truth. There is no such thing as a medication that does not have some side effects or isn't capable of causing severe adverse drug reactions in the recipient patient.

List of Drugs

There is no way of knowing what dose she took or how often she took any of these drugs!

Prozac (SSRI antidepressant) — specific serotonin reuptake inhibitor

Side effects: suicidal ideation; abnormal thinking; emotional lability.

Zoloft (SSRI antidepressant) — specific serotonin reuptake inhibitor

As above

Trazodone — as above; mania; impaired judgment

Seroquel (quetiapine) — keep dose low — no way of knowing what dose she took

Amitriptyline — tricyclic antidepressant

Remeron — (mirtazapine) antipsychotic for major depressive disorders

Valium — antianxiety benzodiazepine — unmasks depression

Klonopin (clonazepam) — As above

Ativan — antianxiety benzodiazepine — As above

Lamictal — antiseizure drug often used as an antidepressant; decreased alertness

Also, with regards to the Duxbury police chief isolating your client on the hospital unit. I would argue that your client is not only in the hospital for medical treatment, but also supposed to receive acute psychiatric care. The Chief's choice to treat the hospital room like a regular jail cell is not only inhumane, but is thwarting your client's treatment plan and causing an immediate threat to the patient's safety and wellbeing. Not ironically, this is the very same harm that the treatment team sought to prevent by recommending Lindsey remain hospitalized and NOT go to jail. Basically people who are acutely mentally ill need the support of their families in order to make fully informed treatment plans and to work together with the patient and provider. Long term success of the patient is based on compliance with the treatment plan, which is especially true in this case where you have a gravely disabled woman who is dependent on her loved ones. She has a head injury and she needs to be able to communicate with her family to make treatment decisions. Period.

Good afternoon Attorney Reddington,

My name is Anne Stevenson and I am a CPCS bar advocate on the North Shore. I'm on the criminal panel and also the mental health panel. Sometimes I am called out of my bat cave to do cases at Bridgewater State Hospital, but I have also represented probably hundreds of civil commitment clients at state and private hospitals all over the state.

Saw your interview today in the Boston Globe about the Lindsey Clancy case and I thought you did a phenomenal job of telling her side of the story.

Wanted to just reach out to you about the upcoming bail hearing and the release conditions you were talking about proposing. If Lindsey doesn't make bail, I think you can make a decent argument to have her evaluated for competency at the private hospital of her choice given her complex medical needs. All the psychiatric units in every hospital are locked units, so as long as she meets level of care placing her there shouldn't be an issue. The only hospital that I'm aware of that has a dual medical/psych unit is MGH in Boston (Blake 11). They work with Spaulding Rehab too. There is nothing to say that Lindsey needs a higher level of security than just a regular locked unit—especially because she's maintained herself in a regular hospital bed for 2 weeks without incident. The only way the DA could justify sending her to like Framingham or a state hospital setting is if they could show that Lindsey poses an imminent safety threat to the staff/programs at a regular hospital.

My advice is to talk to Lindsey's clinical team NOW to try and get a bed lined up for her with a direct referral to the particular hospital where you want her to go. Because otherwise when you raise sections 15(a) or 12(a) the request to place her in a particular hospital may be denied by the court on the grounds that the Court cannot order Worcester Recovery or any other state hospital to take her—DMH just has a bed list and the first bed in the state to open is where she will go. DMH tries to place people closer to their homes so she would be more likely to go to Taunton State Hospital or to one of the Boston area hospitals like Shattuck or BMC (which isn't that bad).

Lastly, that list of medications is horrifying. It is like the doctors just threw spaghetti at a wall to see what would stick. You mentioned involuntary intoxication, so would suggest getting one of the IME's who works with the CPCS mental health unit to look at that. I can't believe the doctor prescribed SSRI's with antipsychotics. It's a tough one because post partum mental illness is unique in that it only happens to women, and it only happens after women give birth. It is not a permanent state or a lifelong affliction—the severity of the acute mental illness fluctuates constantly and is brought on by massive hormone surges. Ordinarily, women's bodies process medications differently depending on their hormone levels which fluctuate depending on where they are in their cycle. So maybe a dose that was good two weeks ago would be too much today. With Post Partum illnesses, I would guess that it is difficult to medicate someone effectively because your hormones haven't stabilized and you can't really predict what your body is doing so you don't know how your body will respond to a drug.

You name a psych med that was available during that time and assure you I was wrongly prescribed it. Including benzodiazepines, anti convulsives, mood stabilizers, lithium, antipsychotics.

After nearly 10 yrs of being off all those meds I'm finally no longer suicidal or psychotic. These drugs are the cause of my breaks and suicidal ideations and paranoia.

I am now 66 yrs old and have been trying to let people know how dangerous these drugs are. Big Pharma pushes these drugs. They are prescribed like candy more and more. Psychiatrists are only trained these days in prescribing these meds. There is no talk therapy at all with psychiatrists. They are also not trained to look for misdiagnoses at all. Please know your client was not in her right from these drugs. Had she not been on those drugs she would have never done what she did. She is victim of the toxic trainings of psychiatry. I wish you luck in fighting for her. If I can be of any assistance please reach out. I will be praying for you all in this fight.

A Genesight test, a gene/drug interaction lab test, might aid in your defense. This must be ordered by a doctor.

Hi Kevin,

I want to help you defend Lyndsay in any way I can. I am willing to go before the courts and the DA. I would not support a murderer, ever. Lyndsay does not belong in prison or a "locked psychiatric facility" which is just another prison with a more palpable name.

Sixteen years ago, I had a postpartum psychosis. I can describe exactly what happens before and after a psychosis, and can say during one, it's a zero state of consciousness. I feel my insight will help you with her defense.

My life before I had my baby was idyllic (successful job, fiancé, lots of travel, tons of friends, very fancy highrise condo) but having a baby did not make me want it back. I wanted to be a stay-at-home mother and live in the suburbs.

Despite access to an extensive amount of financial, psychiatric and childcare support I still went into a psychosis no one could have said would happen before it did, not even my psychiatrist who was one of the best in the country, or my dad who is a GI radiologist at Mass General. My complete psychotic break when I dropped my baby on the floor happened right in front of both my mother and my husband. I was lucid until I was not. It's relatively quick when the "moment" of tragedy begins. I was not suffering from depression at all, and the warning signs I had still did not indicate the need to go inpatient or be under constant supervision. The depression occurred after the psychosis and I feel the antipsychotics given to me for too long a time that caused it. I became an obese, emotionless woman with brain fog who faked a rare smile. Antipsychotics will stabilize but then they double the dose and add more meds. Mentally ill people are guinea pigs in many ways. Postpartum depression rarely leads to psychosis either, otherwise you would be defending thousands of women. What happened to Lyndsay is rare, what happened to me is rare.

Please feel free to call me, I have much to share that you may be able to use in Lyndsay's defense, comforting words for Patrick, and a story to stop some of the much-occurring speculation. What I just typed is a portion of it. My phone number is 617-755-8174.

Dear Mr. Reddington,

I hope this finds you well.

I recently saw an article regarding your Lindsay Clancy defense, alleging that she had been overmedicated at the time of the event of which she's being charged - when I saw the list of medications that she had been prescribed, I had to reach out.

I've worked many years as an RN providing individualized comprehensive health support services to clients and their families, which is a fancy name for trying to figure out why the doctor's orders are not providing the expected results or help to explain why health and behavior has changed dramatically. This has included working 2 years providing these services in a functional psychiatry practice.

As an RN I legally cannot diagnose or prescribe, I can only implement the doctor's orders and report what's going on if things go bad, so this tool has literally been a lifesaver for my clients and has helped to explain 'why' a client may be responding unconventionally to treatment or be exhibiting odd behavior. It's my #1 tool to assist in de-prescribing since it explains potential interactions for physicians, can be added to the medical record and covers all classes of meds and not just psychotropics.

I hope this information makes sense and is helpful for your defense of Ms. Clancy. Should you have any questions, or if I might provide any additional information that might be useful, please just let me know. Should you be interested in pursuing GeneIQ testing, it's a simple mouthswab and there should be providers in Massachusetts - as I said earlier, it's covered by most insurance. Should you have any difficulty finding a provider, please feel free to let me know and I'd be happy to reach out to my local rep to find out who participates in your area or arrange mailing a testing kit to you that can be sent directly to the GeneIQ company for processing (results take around 2 weeks).

If you by any chance are already aware of this test and have obtained a report, please make sure any supplements, herbs or remedies were included in what was assessed, as these can have an adverse effect as well (the report can be re-run if they were missed).

I wish you much luck in your defense of Ms. Clancy (as well as any potential future malpractice suit) and send my support and prayers to the family - there are way too many overmedicated folks out there that are not being listened to or monitored appropriately, and this is a conversation that is long overdue. Hopefully their tragedy can bring awareness to this issue and help them to heal.

Dear Kevin Reddington

I read the sad story of your client Lindsay Clancy and I had to reach out to tell you about akathisia. This is something I have been campaigning and raising awareness about on social media and amongst friends and family for nearly 3 years now (and have been banned, censored, threatened, ridiculed and defended for my troubles).

In 2019 I was on a similar list of drugs as Lindsay, (9 in my case, 2 antipsychotics 3 antidepressants 2 Banzos sleeping pills and ADHD meds) and booked in to have ECT. I had been on psychiatric medication since 1991 (Prozac) and picked up multiple diagnoses along the way. Divine intervention occurred for me though, I woke myself up and instead of doing the ECT which would have been the end of me as it was for my maternal grandmother, I started getting myself off the medication and learning about the iatrogenic damage caused specifically by toxic encephalopathy- akathisia, tardive dyskinesia, anhedonia, dystonia and aphasia. I have now been totally medication free for 18 months, my body is physically shattered possibly permanently, but I'm completely depression and anxiety free. I learnt that I most likely got akathisia when I was cold turkeyed off Prozac 30 years ago.

My story is long, deeply traumatic and complicated, gaslit a 1000 ways I lost everything pretty much a long the way. Over a year of my life in total in psych hospital and 6 suicide attempts. I was fortunate though not to have homicidal thoughts. I was fortunate my beloved son left home at 15 and didn't speak to me for 6 years because of my behaviour. He is back living with me now. But I have supported women the last few years who have been in that situation. I know of other women who have killed their children. And fathers. Because of medication induced akathisia.

So please hear me - Lindsay is not alone in what happened to her- she is not mentally ill. I doubt very much she had post partum psychosis - akathisia is wrongly diagnosed as a whole host of mental illnesses from bipolar to ADHD from OCD to BPD. It's caused by 500 different medications which is 40,000 including the generics. Barely anyone knows about it but big pharma do, they've known since the 1930's that it exists and the Russians induced it in political prisoners to torture them in the 70's. Because it is indeed a torture, that at its worst few survive. I'm a miracle to have survived and I have no idea how long I have left as the physical damage is so bad but with every breath I have left I try to raise awareness and the truth about so called "mental illness" and the pharmaceutical industry.

I was never mentally ill. I was sexually abused as a child. Put on Vallium at 13 and Prozac at 21 and told repeatedly I had a chemical imbalance and I would need these drugs for life. Lies. I've never been happier than I am today, despite the physical torture I'm in, I've never felt more in my right mind. But I had to fight for my life. It has not been easy. And I did it pretty much alone.

Please get in touch with me if there's anything I can do to help- there are not many people who know more about toxic encephalopathy and the psych drugs than me- because I made it my mission to find out exactly what happened to me. I will get no justice, no day in court, no financial retribution, there is no price anyway one can put on the 30 years of torture physically and mentally that I, along with countless others have endured. But what Lindsay has gone through is the absolute worst case scenario with akathisia and my heart breaks for her and her family. They deserve the truth. The question is are you brave enough to research the truth and fight for it? There's a good reason akathisia is not talked about, it would bring down the pharmaceutical industry and they are the most corrupt, evil and powerful industry on the planet. My thoughts and prayers are with Lindsay. She deserves the truth about what happened to her.
